
eace of Christ to you! This will be a little bit different than my normal updates because I did something a little bit different than my normal day here at St. Ambrose Parish. I took a bus trip with parishioners down to Noah's Ark Encounter in Kentucky.

There is a lot to be said about the trip in terms of the people that I met and talked to and the relationships that were formed because of it. I was incredibly blessed to journey with amazing people from St. Ambrose and other parishes from around the area. However, what I shared with them I also wanted to share with you. This was taken from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops regarding Genesis 1-11: "Ancient Near Eastern thinkers did not have our methods of exploring serious questions. Instead, they used narratives for issues that we would call philosophical and theological. They added and subtracted narrative details and varied the plot as they sought meaning in the ancient stories."

In other words, the biblical authors of this section still wrote, guided by the Holy Spirit, to provide answers to

God's being and explain our nature, but at the same time did not create a biographical history like the Noah's Ark Encounter in Kentucky claims. This is the beauty of our Catholic faith on display when looking into Scripture. We are not bound by each word in the Bible as though they were dictated fact. Rather, Scripture is a combination of accounts, stories, and histories all working together to enliven our faith in Jesus Christ.

Here lies the reason why I wanted to journey with so many people to Ark Encounter. It gave a great visual that might deepen our own appreciation for Scripture and remind us to take seriously how God uses the Bible to speak to us today. We don't need to be biblical literalists to still take the Bible seriously. But we should be deeply invested in the importance of Scripture in our lives as those people who believed it important enough to build a one-to-one replica of the Ark. Imagine if each of us took to heart that same level of devotion to living out the Gospel, and how much such devotion would impact our lives and the lives of our families.

A Letter from Our Pastor

A Close Look at Our Parish Finances

Dear Members of St. Joseph and Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary Parishes,

ur annual parish financial reports for St. Joseph and for Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary Parishes are included in this newsletter. Each year we are required to submit a report of the finances of our parishes to the Diocese of Cleveland as well as a report to you, the members of our parishes. And so, I ask you to take a good look at these reports of money that has come in and money that has been spent over the last fiscal year which ran from July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023. Also included are our budgets for the current fiscal year, ending June 30, 2024.

As stewardship parishes, we concentrate on sharing the God-given gifts of our time our talent, and our treasure. I want to thank all of you who are so faithful to Sunday offertory each week and month using your envelopes or online giving through direct debit or by credit card. You enable us to do as parishes what we do.

Sometimes people will say, "The Church should take care of that. "Which translated means, "Other people should take care of that. "They also say, "The Church has tons of money. "A careful look at our financial reports quickly dispels that myth. We need to remember that we are the Church. Each of us is a member of the Body of Christ. And each of us is called to be a fully participating member of the Church.

As you look over these financial reports, I ask you to consider whether the amount of your weekly or monthly offering might call for some adjusting. Sometimes we get used to a particular amount and it is good to review our personal circumstances and see if this gift of our treasure accurately reflects our life right now.

Household and personal expenses are going up each year, and so are those of our parishes. Whether talking about our parishes or our households, we cannot afford to pay our bills by depleting our savings. As participating members of our parish families, what is the Lord asking of you right now in terms of sharing a portion of the treasure that He has entrusted to you?





Several people are making their Sunday offerings by online giving through myEoffering. I have been using online giving for my own regular contributions to the Sunday offertory to St. Joseph and Nativity parishes for a lot of years now. Online giving ensures that the Lord gets our first fruits each month, that the parish receives this contribution when people are out of town, and it also is more convenient for those who use this method regularly to pay their bills.

For St. Joseph parishioners and Nativity parishioners, signing up is as simple as going to the parish website — www. stjosephamherst.com — and clicking on "eOffering" on the home page. This will take you to myEoffering where you may sign up, indicate your parish, and then begin giving online.

I stand in gratitude for the goodness of the people of our St. Joseph and Nativity Parish families. Thank you so much for sharing so generously your time, your talent, and your treasure so that the Lord's work may be done. And may the Lord continue to bless you and those you love, richly and warmly.



Celebrating the Feast of St. Leo the Great,



egarded as one of the best administrators of the ancient Church, St. Leo the Great displayed tireless dedication as pope. From securing true Christian beliefs and settling doctrinal controversies as a Doctor of the Church, to defending Rome against barbarian attack and his commitment to the spiritually centered pastoral care of his people, St. Leo the Great provides a wonderful — and historically significant — example of a Church administrator who used his skills to reinforce the essential connections between spirit and structure. This resolute upholding of the faith earned him the title of "the Great." Indeed, Leo himself held that everything he did as pope was to represent St. Peter, in whose place he acted, and to represent Christ, the head of the Mystical Body.

A native of Tuscany, Leo was believed to have been born around the year 400. The earliest known information about Leo is that he was a deacon under Pope Celestine I and Pope Sixtus III. During his time as a deacon, he was already recognized for his skills in mediation when the emperor designated him with the task of settling a dispute between the two highest officials in Gaul.

In the year 440, upon the death of Pope Sixtus III, Leo was unanimously elected by the people as the pope's successor. Just weeks later, he would enter upon a pontificate lasting 21 years. This timespan would prove to be a crucial era for the centralization of the government in the Roman Church.

Importantly, Leo's recorded papal letters and sermons have survived through the centuries, thus providing key historical sources regarding his career and personality. In fact, his particular prose style — *cursus leonicus* — would have a lasting impact on ecclesiastical language.

A major priority during Leo's papacy was to sustain the unity of the Church — he was devoted to combating the heresies that threatened this unity. He was also a tireless champion of almsgiving, fasting, and prayer, while clearly and concisely expounding Catholic doctrine. Leo put much of what he said and wrote into action as well, inviting and encouraging bishops to meet and consult with him in person.

These committed efforts took place largely in the shadow of the Western Empire's approaching collapse, and Leo would serve as a steadfast representative of lawful authority during this turbulent era.

Indeed, a crucial point of Leo's papacy occurred during the invasion of Italy in 452. As Attila and his forces made their way to Rome, having already overrun several cities, the ruler of the Huns demanded a dowry from the reigning emperor. As a result, three envoys were sent to negotiate with Attila — one of which was Pope Leo I. While the exact nature of the envoys' negotiations with Attila are not

known, historians often credit Leo with compelling Attila to withdraw from invading Rome. And while the Vandals would sack the city of Rome just three years later, it is believed that Leo's assertiveness and influence also helped to repress murder and bloodshed during this invasion.

Even as he maintained courage in the face of such challenges, Leo continually worked to address the everyday needs, concerns, and interests of his people. He died in the year 461, most probably on Nov. 10 — which is celebrated in the Catholic Church as the feast day of St. Leo the Great.

— Maggie played volleyball last year, and they all look forward to the years when Jacob can play.

"We enjoy CYO programs as they instill faith into athletics, teach teamwork, and promote respect towards the opponents and officials," Ashley says.

"Youth choir has been a great experience for her, and it connected us with the church in a different way that we really enjoy and look forward to continuing," Ashley says.

Matt and Ashley recognize the need to be involved so that things like the Coming Together event and CYO sports can happen. But there's another essential aspect at play — setting a strong stewardship example for Jude, Maggie, and Jacob.

"They recognize our involvement provides a deeper connection with the parish and school community," Ashley says.

The members of the Hasel family have also gotten to know new people through stepping up and being involved. Sharing her time and talents with the school has helped Ashley feel more connected to the children's education. She's not just an observer — she has a hands-on role.

The whole family is thankful for the community they have found at St. Joseph's Parish and School. They've made friends they know will be there with them through the ups and downs and look forward to continuing to meet people and make memories.

"We always feel welcome at the parish and enjoy seeing other school families at Mass," Ashley says.
